In 2005, I was in Silliman. I missed Jim's voice in the choir. I endeavored to engage Jim in conversation; he was no longer very coherent. I was sad. I could sense that he was lonely.

Silliman University, and the Philippines, have been fortunate to have had Jim and Mimi, with their children, live and work in the Philipines, in the prime of their lives.
